
APOSTLES' CREED

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

FIRST READING Genesis 1:1-5

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, ²the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. ³Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. ⁴And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

SECOND READING Acts 19:1-7

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. ²He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." ³Then he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." ⁴Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." ⁵On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. ⁶When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied—⁷ altogether there were about twelve of them.

THE HOLY GOSPEL Mark 1:4-11 (Please stand)

⁴John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

EPIPHANY 1, Baptism of Our Lord

Johnny wanted to join a Baptist church and be baptized with total body immersion. But there was a problem. He was 6'5" tall and 350 pounds. He won't fit in a church baptistry. He knew a Baptist pastor whose daughter he dated in college, so he asked him to help with a baptism. Pastor Johnson looked him up and down and said, "Johnny, if you're serious, just dipping you and getting you a little wet won't do. We're going to have to find a place in Clear Lake to anchor you overnight."

As you know, Sam Houston was the first president of the Republic of Texas. He was also, in 1827, the governor of Tennessee, the only man to preside over two of these United States. In 1832, he bludgeoned a congressman from Ohio for calling him a fraud. He used a hickory cane harvested from the estate of President Andrew Jackson. He was a brawler. As a teenager he ran away from home and became a member of the Cherokee nation. He wore native American garb to Congress and pressed for Indian rights. He was an enthusiastic brawler, personally, politically and militarily. His second marriage to Margaret Lea, a devout Baptist changed his life. With her support and help, he made a commitment to Christ.

His baptism was arranged for November 19, 1854. Pastor Rufus C. Burleson, the pastor of Independence Baptist Church and the president of Baylor, did the baptism in the "Baptizing Hole", on Rocky Creek, south of College Station. 250 people were there to watch and celebrate as a cold front blew in from the northeast. Pastor Burleson commented, "You should give someone your watch and your wallet."

General Houston said, "I'm afraid my wallet needs baptizing too."

Coming up out of the freezing water, Pastor Burleson said, "Well, General, all your sins have been washed away!"

"If that be the case, Pastor," replied Houston, "God help the fish down below!" Known for his foul mouth, he never cursed again, and he gave generously to Independence Baptist Church and Baylor University. He was a messy guy, but he was fully engaged in service to humankind.

To the untrained eye, I am sure that Jesus looked pretty messy too. Really, is that what God made Man is supposed to look like. Common ideas of the attributes of messiahs were idealized impossibilities. Jesus came to put the Mess in Messiah.

From early childhood on, we are trained to work for good grades, privileges, to earn exemptions, to stack up points for future use, and to save tokens of imputed value to turn in for redemption later. Investing in Cultural Indulgences! We make heroes of those who seem exempt from the usual problems of life, and we admire those who have privilege. Celebrity sets a standard that is impossible to realize, and occasionally fatal to attempt, even when you are a celebrity. You wanna be a real gangsta? A celebrity player on the hip scene?

Better invest first in bail bond companies, legal fee escrows, bodyguards, rehabs, STD medicines, body armor, and a gated house with walls and security. Perhaps it is harder for celebrities than it is for Mr. Average, because we only see the glitter and the mythical commercial spin. But the celebrity feels the pain and knows with guilt the vast discrepancy between the way things really is and the image projected. There's a big difference between a mirror and a camera. You can cover up the kink in your slinky with a camera, but you can't fix it. Let's face it. Although exemption and privilege are fondly held dreams, there is no such thing as permanent entitlement. If you don't believe me, ask any midwife or undertaker.

Hope is not a bad thing. Dreams and ambitions are motivating. Realistic privileges and realistic exemptions can be the result of realistic ambitions. Most people who are virtuoso musicians and enjoy the benefits of their skill would be offended if we discounted their skill as mere genius, not taking into account the hours and years of practice that got them to that point. Choices and sacrifices preceded the privileges. It was a difficult messy road. But worth it.

Too often, the hope is for a quicker fix. John the Baptist was trying to fix the messy world. Jesus entered into the mess in solidarity through his baptism. He put the Mess in Messiah.

Things are never as good as we imagine they could be. The world is a mess. That's nothing new. It always has been a mess. We dream of ways to get out of the mess, or maybe even be exempt from the mess. Messianic hopes have always abounded, and always will. Who will save us from the mess and grant exemptions? In Jesus' day that was obviously an issue, but no more so than in our day. But exemption is not redemption.

Every individual, family, community, and culture have some idea of what they think might save us from the mess. We harbor in our hearts some wonderful ideas concerning fixing the mess. The arts, and the narratives of our culture, those who we lift up and admire as celebrities, and the heroes and nobles that pass out privileges and exemptions can give us some interesting clues as to the messianic expectations of our age. Maybe the next batch of lords and leaders will institute justice and save us all from the mess.

Do you want to research this? Do you want to know about the subliminal messianic hopes of American culture? Then start reading comic books. Most are now being made into epic films, a resurgence of poignant pining for the perfect privileges. Super heroes with super skills and super ambitions to save abound. All are exempt from one or more of the limiting features of life. They are above the mess.

Superman's lucky. He is exempt from gravity. Saves on airfare, not to mention a future without jowls, or wattles, or Dunlap's Disease (where your belly done lapped over your belt). Richard Reed, the Elastic Man from Fantastic Four is exempt from the limitation of a body in space. He can stretch any part of his body into a thread an atom wide. Just think. You could stretch your arm out the car window on the freeway and tap the guy in the next car on the shoulder to remind him to turn his blinker off. Clean up that messy driving on the freeway. The flame-on guy never has to worry about finding a lighter while driving and still paying attention to the road. The last time I did that, I was feeling around in the console, grabbed what felt exactly like a lighter, and inadvertently maced myself. The piquant combination of tear gas and pepper spray was provocative. It's one way to quit smoking.

For their part, both Batman and Spiderman never have to worry about traffic. And they fight crime and clean up urban messes. Wouldn't it be nice to be a part of the Justice League and help them enforce a "NO MESS" policy against the Legion of Doom? Then we could sit back like Alfred E. Neumann and say, "What, Me Worry?" No more mess.

That's all well and good for ideologues and dreamers, but it doesn't work in human society. Someone else's idea of perfection may well be your experience of slavery. In shaping a perfect Rousseauian society of Noble Savages, the French Revolution managed to kill 600,000 of its own citizens. In contrast, the American Revolution proceeded on the assumption that all people are messy but they will work toward their own advantage and their own dream, and in the process make life better for themselves and the people around them. A constitutional republic with checks and balances will help to mediate a workable society.

But of course, we know that there is One who is more exempt from everything than a United States Congressman. There is One who enjoys all privilege, power, and entitlement. And we call him God, right?

Well, at one time in the era that we call B.C., that may have been the case for many deep religious thinkers. After all, in trying to visualize the unimaginable, the best we can do is imagine what might give us temporary relief from the day-to-day mess. Hence messianic expectations. Another way to tell God what you think he could be doing. That's not an especially original sin. We all do it and I'm guessing that God's used to that and that's why he sent his son, Jesus. To put a little mess back in Messiah.

Even John the Baptizer, according to Jesus, the Greatest Prophet, did it. Matthew 3:13-15. "Sorry cousin, but you get a baptismal exemption today. No need for you to get wet or muddy." And here is an example of Jesus saying "NO". John is willing to extend executive privilege and (ha, ha) save Jesus...from the troubles of the human mess.

For \$14.50 you can buy a product called 'Sprayonmud' that you can put on your 4WD truck so it looks like you've been mudding. It is a rationale for your environmentally aware neighbors about why you are driving a wilderness equipped SUV with 30-inch tires, eight feet tall, and mileage in the single digits, to soccer practice.

The one thing I love about God is that he is not embodied in a pretentious fake messiah. That in creating reality, he is absolutely true to what is real. In the Baptism of Jesus, He steps into the muddy water with us. He doesn't exempt himself from messy life. He doesn't use Sprayonmud so he'll just look authentic. He is authentic. He shares the messes of our wildernesses, our temptations, our unrealistic expectations that disappoint us, our desires for privilege, and all of our struggles. He shares the final mess of extreme prejudice on a cross. Thank God, Jesus came to put the mess in Messiah!

Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


