BERGY'S BABBLE: "HALLOW YOUR DIMINISHMENTS"

We are solidly into the New Year of 2024 now. I like New Year's resolutions: Started in the Christmas season, sometimes I can keep them well into the Epiphany season. Usually by Lent it is time to revise and renew them with a penitential twist. For example, last year, I started with "Exercise." Somehow, by Lent, in weakness, it had turned into "Extra Fries." It rhymed and sounded tastier.

This year I am going with the <u>7 Ups</u>.

- 1. Wake UP: <u>Start with a prayer</u>. Thank the Lord for His day. Rejoice and be glad in it.
- 2. Suit UP: <u>Put on a smile</u>. Even scary, mean people look better when they smile. If you can't smile, whistle a tune.
- 3. Shut UP: One tongue, two ears. Use proportionally. Listen while praying.
- 4. Stand UP: <u>Resist evil</u>. Don't argue. Simply be gracious and point to the truth.
- 5. Look UP: <u>Watch for the Lord.</u> In all events, places and people. In everything.
- 6. Reach UP: <u>Ask the Lord for help</u>. Pray, give thanks, confess shortcomings, and adore Him.

<u>All of these 7-UPs, are reminders that self-control</u> is a beautiful gift to develop, part of the Image of God.

One day, I was walking past a green in Memorial Park and a man was lining up a shot with his wedge. It was supposed to go up high with backspin, land near the cup and stop, or better yet fall in. Instead, the ball overshot and rolled into the water hazard behind the green. Apparently, it was an important shot. He turned red, bent his wedge into a pretzel and threw it into the pond, yelling, "Thomas Jefferson!!" Later that day, I was watching the plumber fix a pipe and his wrench slipped, mashing his fingers. With tears in his eyes, he hollered, "Mahatma Gandhi!!!" Since the epithets were heading in an easterly direction, I expected to next, witness somebody stubbing their toe and yelling, "Parmahansa Yogananda."

Just kidding. But don't you think it is strange that people even use Jesus' name to curse in emotional outbursts. You can't get away from this man Jesus. He is in every aspect of life. This baby changed the world. God is with us now. For Him, that is a voluntary diminishment.

God has made himself dependent on humanity. That which is created in his own image. God grows through willing sacrifice. So do we. It's called self-control, part of His Image that we can share. Isn't it nice to know that God has self-control! He submits himself to the processes of the material world, the joys and sorrows of the 3 Laws of Thermodynamics, and Newton's Laws of Motion. No hall pass here. No executive privilege. It is a sacrificial diminishment from the divine perfection of the Godhead.

Born under the law, born of the flesh, Luke underscores the faithful, liturgical Jewishness of Jesus and his family.

Essential to the Jewish and Christian way of living is the praise of God in every situation in life. God is to be honored in rising up and lying down, in leaving and returning. God is to be honored in the acts of eating and making love, sleeping, bathing, and dressing for the day. The sad, secular, modern life has reduced the holy significance of the normal, daily, usual stuff that we do. Daily living is diminished and not held up as dedicated to God.

Many see nothing holy about life and don't recognize God. How can they even live, without feeling the glow? Others are able to celebrate with God continually and make holy even the times of disaster and diminishment.

Hallow your diminishments. God has diminished himself into time and flesh and the grinding routine of growing up in both suffering and joy just like us. He's still God and no less holy or divine.

What happens when something divine happens to us, enters us. It's OK.....We still go stage by stage through the realities of law, and truth. What do you do after enlightenment? You do the chores. Clean the toilets. Dust the furniture. Change the diaper. Do the dishes, check the oil, and make someone smile with a loving act. God didn't take any exemptions. I can't improve on that!



Pastor Berggren asked Council to think about the annual Gulf Coast Synod Assembly, which will be held May 17 and 18, 2024. Pastor Berggren's other activities included preparing for worship services each week; making phone calls and visits to parishioners; providing counseling and ministering for prayer requests (coordinating with Deacon Donahue); outreach to the community; weekly Wednesday Bible Study; attending choir practice and various church ministry meetings.

Committee Reports and Old Business:

Nominating Committee: President Lambeth reiterated that the Nominating Committee must have a Council representative on the committee. Under the current bylaws this person must be a continuing member (of Council), not someone up for reelection. There was additional discussion, and Warren Schick agreed to serve in this capacity; Council approved his nomination to this position. The possibility of changing the bylaws in the future was also discussed.

Improvements to Campus / Building and Grounds (B&G):

- Ms. Lambeth recognized the work of the Memorial Fund Committee (Tillie Remmert, Penny Schick, Hanne-Lore Sunder) and Selvin Young in completing several campus beautification projects including: 1) coordinating the design and installation of the memorial garden in the Westview courtyard, as well as the refurbishment of the breezeway sitting area adjacent to the playground.
- Ms. Beamesderfer added that Alan Lambeth was researching options to update the lighting in the church office after the first of the year. She noted how much Holy Cross relies on his expertise and is thankful for his generosity with his time to help with an aging campus.

- Ceiling repaired in sanctuary choir loft.
- Improvements to HCLC streaming.
- Stewardship Sunday reinstituted.
- New system for coffee preparation.
- New Daisy Girl Scout troop at HCLC.
- Maintenance upgrades and refurbishments.
- New members welcomed into HCLC.
- New fence around A/C unit (Eagle Scouts)

She remarked that there are so many who are working hard at Holy Cross in many different areas, and she wanted to express her appreciation for all their efforts.

The January Council meeting was scheduled for Sunday, January 21, 2024 at 11:00 a.m.

Upon motion to adjourn, the meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.



We will begin to gather at **3:00 pm** and supper will be served at **4:00 pm**.


We will be having baked potatoes with all the trimmings.
