BERGY'S BABBLE: "A SHEEPISH AFFAIR"

"Mardon me padam. I believe you are occupewing my pie. May I sew you to another sheet?" That is a famous spoonerism said by the Reverend William Archibald Spooner, a pastor of the Church of England, and a Warden of Oxford University in the late 1800's, through 1930. Sometimes he scrambled his words and syllables. At the conclusion of a wedding, he told the couple, "It is kisstomary to cuss the bride." Preaching on today's text, he piously intoned that, "the Lord is a shoving leopard."

Jesus, as a Loving Shepherd is one of the most cherished images of our Lord. Isn't it curious that we also image Jesus as the Lamb of God? He's one of us, too.

One year, Mr. Olson was our high school music student teacher in choir, band and orchestra. The day we met him, we were startled, when he, with difficulty, clattered his way to the podium with full leg braces and fancy crutches. It was like Robo-Teach. He smiled and said, Mr. Berggren, could you please pass these papers out to the group?" They were instructions explaining his battle with polio, and physical weakness, and how to follow his way of directing. He was great. You had to watch so carefully; not just waving arms but moving the muscles of his face, the John Belushi eyebrow lift, his eyes and pointing his nose, wagging his head and nodding. You had to be a smart sheep, extremely observant, to follow this shepherd. This shepherd drew you into his world, a strange and helpless place, and you became workers together for the same goal. Good music. Normally unruly and hormonal high school children were fascinated by his direction. What will this cool shepherd to next?

He was chosen to be the Master of Ceremonies for Stunt Night at Bethany College, an evening of fraternity and sorority skits with jokes, talent acts, and entertainment. He introduced each act with a joke, just like a vaudeville. As the program was concluding, he laboriously crutched to center stage, wearing a superman costume. He whipped a bottle marked 'geritol' out of his cape and chugged it down, and threw it and a crutch to one side. Teetering, he rummaged around and found another bottle of 'geritol' in his cape, chugged it and threw the other crutch to the ground. And he fell flat with a noisy clatter. The audience was shocked, silent, blown away. Nobody knew how to react. And he laid there, grinning at us from the floor.

Some people started clapping and laughing nervously. A muffled titter ran through the crowd. It grew into a loud cheer of relieved approval. Stage hands rushed out and braced him upright. They gave him a director's baton, and he directed the thundering applause, pointing to different sections of the auditorium, which responded with a roar. The north side of Presser Hall roared, and then the south side roared back antiphonally. It was high-decibel liturgy, led by a humble shepherd, a true leader. The most helpless guy in the room, controlled a packed auditorium of robust college kids who were getting a life lesson. Incredible. Those kids weren't stupid. They recognized true courage. They figured out, Mr. Olson knew the score. He was a great shepherd!

Abraham, Jacob, Isaac, Moses and David were all shepherds, good successful shepherds. Their skills with their flocks directly transferred to their leadership qualities, which involved vigilance, kindness, teamwork, calmness, patience, a sense of direction, a lot of prayer, and benign control.

Sheep/sinners generally know their own propensity for straying. Strays aren't always bad. They <u>are</u> in danger. Their situation is often inadvertent, not deliberate rebellion. Not orneriness but instead, cluelessness. In grazing, one green clump of grass leads to another. Sheep/sinners are by nature, instinctually, busy grazers. They are busy to distraction, which leaves out situational awareness.

They will move toward the greener grass, and always move uphill, because they are rear-wheel drive organisms, with most of their weight on the backside. They are happiest and the least worried when they congregate, grazing in a flock with many eyes looking out for danger, and a sheep dog, and a shepherd to watch them. They get along great with other species of very different abilities and intelligences. Even people have a hard time with that cooperative ecumenicity. Sheep exploit the added protection of other larger grazing livestock, like llamas, goats, cattle and donkeys, and will form a flerd, (flock/herd) with a variety of other larger herbivores. "Hey Ewe! I'm a Buffalo and I've got your back!" Whew!!!! That's reassuring!

It is just a matter of getting rid of that stigma of sheep being seen as stupid. Great associations of people and communities operate like a smart flock of sheep. Sheep/ sinners are smart. We help each other to safety and security. We watch out for each other. We move away from danger to a higher vantage point. We form productive alliances with other groups. Predatory people and situations are always there. When we are distracted with the basics of life, it is good to know that there are friendly sheep dogs to encourage and redirect the slow of heart, and the great Good Shepherd there for the most crucial issues.

The Lord is a loving shepherd. I love my Good Shepherd. With his guidance and protection, I pray that I can be a Good Sheep!

Holy Cross Lutheran Church (HCLC) Minutes for Council Meeting – March 17, 2024

The March 2024 Church Council meeting was called to order by President Wendy Lambeth on Sunday, March 17, 2024 at 11:00 a.m. Pastor Berggren opened with a prayer.

In attendance were: Pastor Jim Berggren, Wendy Lambeth, Nancy Beamesderfer, Linda Cuzzort, Ricki Finstad, Julie Kilkenny, Warren Schick and Stephanie Walton. Wayne Schaper was absent. Stephen Schulze attended as a special guest.

The minutes from the February 2024 meeting were submitted by Council Secretary Julie Kilkenny and approved by Council.

The **Treasurer's report** was presented by Ricki Finstad. February 2024 offerings were \$17,478, a decrease of \$13,508 from January. Expenses for the month of February were \$33,026, a decrease of \$7,328 from January. However, the February deficit (of expenses over offerings) was \$15,548. The checking account balance at 02/29/24 was \$22,439, not including restricted funds. Dr. Finstad provided a summary of investments this month. Council approved the Treasurer's Report.

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Pastor Berggren gave a brief summary of his annual report to Gulf Coast Synod Bishop Rinehart. He elaborated about his response to a question about significant developments at Holy Cross during the past year: 1) livestreaming of weekly worship service, 2) weekly recording of sermon YouTube channel in advance of weekend services (for those who cannot attend in-person), 4) HCLC support of the ESB Food Pantry, which is a significant outreach ministry for Holy Cross and other area churches, serving 57,504 people last year.

He noted other community outreach in the form of sharing HCLC facilities with the Early Learning Center, a Boy Scout troop, a Girl Scout Daisy troop, youth basketball teams, classes in art, CPR and first aid. Pastor Berggren reached out to Officer Moore (Spring Valley Police) about a review of security protocols for HCLC; he will keep Council updated on developments, and he expects to meet in March or April. His regular activities include preparing for worship and Lenten services each week; making phone calls and visits to parishioners; providing counseling and ministering for prayer requests [coordinating with Deacon Donahue]; outreach to the community; weekly Wednesday Bible Study; attending choir practice and various church ministry meetings.

Committee Reports and Old Business:

WELCA: Nancy Beamesderfer reported that WELCA will sponsor a potluck meal after worship on May 15th and probably one in October. ThankOffering weekend will be on November 9th and 10th.

Congregational Meeting Update: President Lambeth remarked that the Congregational Meeting Part II went well. She noted feedback she received about the large of amount of paper used in the packets distributed to parishioners at the meeting, specifically the committee and ministry reports. After some discussion, Council approved a plan to decrease the number of Committee reports provided at the Annual meeting; instead, committees can provide updates for the congregation during the year via Crossties, Sunday News articles, etc.

C12.01 VIII (regarding composition and voting status of Council)

C14.01 IX (regarding the Memorial Fund Committee)

Installation of new members was scheduled for April 7, 2024.

Youth:

- President Lambeth reported that **VBS** plans are underway. The camp will take place July 22-26, 2024.
- Ms. Walton reported that six **Boy Scouts** received Eagle Scout status this month. Ms. Lambeth remarked on the successful Scout Sunday service.

Improvements to Campus / Building and Grounds (B&G):

• Pastor Berggren commented on the improvements around the church grounds. The Memorial Fund Committee has been working on landscape projects in the Westview courtyard, the walkway to the south entrance to the Atrium, and restoring the plantings outside of the playground which were damaged by the drought last summer.

An Eagle Scout project to add benches outside of the Pantry entrance not only provide a welcome amenity for Pantry clients, but enhance the HCLC campus as well. He praised HCLC member Tristan Walton's Eagle Scout project to upgrade the ELC playground.

- President Lambeth reported that Dr. Finstad is researching options for the FLC kitchen icemaker. He is looking into a smaller, self-cleaning icemaker. This would eliminate the cost of the current maintenance agreement. Council approved this measure.
- President Lambeth repeated her desire to address the challenges with the commercial stove in the FLC kitchen, i.e., the pilots for the burners blowing out and the accompanying odor, the commercial ventilation system and recurring inspection costs.

Lent and Easter: Pastor Berggren reported that things were on track for Easter. Council discussed plans for Holy Week.

Food Pantry: President Lambeth reported on developments for the proposed Food Pantry expansion. A resident in the neighborhood, who is not in favor of the expansion, has presented his opposition at several meetings of the Hilshire Village Council and Planning Committee. Council had a lengthy discussion about possible solutions/compromises for this problem.

New Business:

Ms. Lambeth was approached by Marilyn Flick about Holy Cross participation in a hospitality ministry program in the Medical Center. Currently she collects calendars and miscellaneous items from the congregation to distribute for patients' families who are temporarily staying in the Medical Center. She noted they need more calendars, note pads and bingo prizes; President Lambeth asked her to check on what items they are requesting, so it can be publicized.

Treasurer Finstad asked whether Telge Lot 1 was still on the market, as he was approached by someone interested in the property. Council asked him to get more details on the serious-ness of the buyer and report back with any developments.

On behalf of the Council and congregation, Ms. Kilkenny expressed thanks to all outgoing Council and Committee members for their service to Holy Cross; and also, to all returning and newly elected members.

The April Council meeting was scheduled for Sunday, April 21, 2024 at 11:00 a.m.

Upon motion to adjourn, the meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.
