EPIPHANY 1C, <u>Baptism of Our Lord</u>. 1-12-25, Lk 3.15-17, 21-22 THE MESS IN MESSIAH

Sam Houston, born 221 years ago in 1793, was the first President of the Republic of Texas. He was also, in 1827, the Governor of Tennessee, the only man to preside as Executive Office over two of our United States. He was a founder, a rounder and a rough customer. In 1832, he bludgeoned a congressman from Ohio for calling him a fraud. He used a hickory cane harvested from the estate of President Andrew Jackson, a close friend. He was a drinker and a brawler. As a teenager he ran away from home and became a member of the Cherokee nation. He wore native American garb to Congress and pressed for Indian rights. He was an enthusiastic fighter, personally, politically and militarily. His first marriage lasted 3 months. His second marriage was to Margaret Lea, a devout Texas Baptist. She changed his life. Love changed his life. With her support and help, he made a commitment to Christ.

His baptism was arranged for November 19, 1854. He was baptized by Pastor Rufus C. Burleson, the pastor of Independence Baptist Church and the 2nd and 6th President of Baylor. In his last term as Baylor President, in 1886, he was instrumental in making Baylor a Coeducational College. He presided over 61-year-old, Sam Houston's baptism in the "Baptizing Hole", on Rocky Creek, south of College Station. Baylor in its earliest years was near Bryan, Texas. 250 people were there to watch and celebrate as a cold front blew in from the northeast. Pastor Burleson commented, "You should give someone your watch and your wallet."

General Houston said, "I'm afraid my wallet needs baptizing too."

Coming up out of the freezing water, Pastor Burleson said, "Well, General, all your sins have been washed away!"

"If that be the case, Pastor," replied Houston, "God help the fish down below!" Known for his colorful language, he never cursed again, and he gave generously to Independence Baptist Church and Baylor University. He was a messy guy, but he was fully engaged in service to humankind. Early Church Father, Irenaeus, fighting the heresy of Gnosticism called this, "The Scandal of the Incarnation."

To the untrained eye, I am sure that Jesus looked pretty messy too. Really. Is that what God taking human form is supposed to look like? Common ideas of the attributes of messiahs were idealized impossibilities. Jesus came as an authentic Messiah. He came to put the Mess in Messiah.

From early childhood on, we are trained to work for good grades, privileges, to earn exemptions, to stack up points for future use, and to save tokens of imputed value to turn in for redemption later. We try to look good with virtue signaling, we show off our wealth with conspicuous consumption. These are forms of Cultural Indulgences and self-validation. We could use a little Reformation here!

We make heroes of those who seem exempt from the usual problems of life, and we grudgingly and jealously, admire those who have privilege. Celebrity sets a standard that is impossible to realize, and occasionally fatal to attempt, especially if you are the celebrity. It can get out of hand with stimulants for performance in the public eye, and depressants for sleep.

Perhaps it is harder for celebrities than it is for Mr. and Ms. Average, because we only see the glitter and the mythical commercial spin. But the celebrity feels the pain and knows with guilt, the vast discrepancy between the way things really are and the image projected. There's a big difference between a mirror and a camera. Everybody's got a kink in their slinky. We call that Original Sin. You can cover up the kink in your slinky with a camera, but you can't fix it. Only the Lord God Almighty can with His Grace. Let's face it. Although exemption and privilege are fondly held dreams, there is no such thing as permanent entitlement.

Hope is not bad. Dreams and ambitions are motivating. Realistic privileges can be the result of realistic ambitions. Most people who are virtuoso musicians and enjoy the benefits of their skill would be offended if we discounted their skill as mere genius, not taking into account the hours and years of practice that got them to that point. Choices and sacrifices preceded the privileges. It was a difficult messy road. But worth it.

Too often, the hope is for a quicker fix. John the Baptist was trying to fix the messy world, but Jesus surprised him. Jesus didn't ride into the wilderness on a big white horse leading an army. What a shock, that he got down in the mud with everyone else to be baptized. Jesus entered into the mess in solidarity through his baptism. He put the Mess in Messiah.

Things are never as good as we would have hoped they could be. That's reality. The world is a mess. That's nothing new. It always has been a mess. Ancient writings of the Assyrian Empire indicate that the ruling generation worried about the quality of the next generation to come into power. Those kids!!!!!

We dream of ways to get out of the mess, or maybe even be exempt from the mess. Messianic hopes have always abounded, and always will. Will the next charismatic ruler save us from the mess and grant exemptions? In Jesus' day that was obviously an issue, but no more so than in our day. But exemption is not redemption.

Every individual, family, community, and culture have some idea of what they think might save us from the mess. We harbor in our hearts some wonderful ideas concerning fixing the mess. The arts, and the narratives of our culture, those who we lift up and admire as celebrities, and the heroes and nobles that pass out privileges and exemptions can give us some interesting clues as to the messianic expectations of our age. Maybe the next batch of lords and leaders will dictate justice and save us all from the mess.

Would you be interested in researching this? Do you want to know about all the subliminal messianic hopes of American culture? Then start reading comic books. Most are now being made into epic films, a resurgence of poignant pining for perfect privileges. Super heroes with super skills and super ambitions to save Gotham and indeed the whole Universe, abound. All are exempt from one or more of the limiting features of life. They are above the mess.

Superman is lucky. He's exempt from gravity. Gravity gets us all, sooner or later. The Human Torch, (the flame-on guy) in the Fantastic Four, never has to worry about starting a fire or finding a match. A couple of decades ago, I was driving, and feeling around in the truck console, carefully keeping my eyes and my mind on the road. I grabbed what felt like a lighter, and inadvertently maced myself. Apparently, someone in my family thought that a personal container of pepper spray might come in handy in a road rage encounter. The combination of tear gas and pepper spray was amazing. Another incentive to quit smoking.

For their part, both Batman and Spiderman never have to worry about traffic. They are above it all: And they fight crime and clean up urban messes. Wouldn't it be nice to be a part of the Justice League, or Guardians of The Galaxy, and help them enforce a "NO MESS" policy against the Legion of Doom?

The wish dreams of ambitious political philosophers throughout the millennia have not made any better sense and their intended or unintended consequences for human life have been devastating. Someone else's idea of perfection may well be your experience of slavery. In shaping a perfect Rousseauian society of Noble Savages, the French Revolution managed to kill 600,000 of its own citizens. The guillotine was definitely savage, but not very noble. It remained Fance's standard method of judicial execution until 1981 when capital punishment was abolished in France.

In contrast, the American Revolution proceeded on the assumption that all people are messy; (There is that Original Sin thing popping up again) but if free, the people will choose to work toward their own advantage, and their own dream. It makes common sense. It may seem self-serving, but in the process, people will make life better for themselves and the people around them. If you decapitate someone,

you just lost a customer, and his family and friends. That's not good business. These are the inner thoughts of our wise founders, as they sought a better way to make it possible for people to govern themselves, in a civilized manner. It is simple. A constitutional republic with checks and balances will help to mediate a workable society.

But of course, we know that there is One who is more exempt from everything than a United States Congressman. There is One who enjoys all privilege, power, and entitlement. And we call him God, right?

Well, at one time, in the era that we call B.C., that may have been the case for many deep religious thinkers. After all, in trying to visualize the unimaginable, the best we can do is imagine what might give us temporary relief from the day-to-day mess. Hence messianic expectations. Another way to tell God what you think he could be doing. That's <u>not</u> an especially <u>original</u> sin. We all do it, and I'm guessing that God is accustomed to that, and that's why he sent his son, Jesus. To put a little mess back in Messiah. To make God <u>real</u> for everyone.

Even John the Baptizer, according to Jesus, the Greatest Prophet, did it. Matthew 3:13-15. "Sorry cousin, but you get a baptismal exemption today. No need for you to get wet or muddy." And here is an example of Jesus saying "NO". John is willing to extend executive privilege and (ha, ha) save Jesus? from the troubles of the human mess.

One thing I love about God is that he is not embodied in a pretentious fake messiah, a tyrant in an earthly kingdom. I love that in creating reality, he is absolutely faithful to what is real. In the Baptism of Jesus, He steps into the muddy water with us. He doesn't exempt himself from messy life. He doesn't just look authentic. He is authentic. He shares the messes of our wildernesses, our temptations, our unrealistic expectations that disappoint us, our desires for privilege, and all of our struggles. He shares the final mess of extreme prejudice on a cross. Thank God, Jesus came to put the mess in Messiah! Amen.
