The Wedding at Cana

On the third day there was a marriage at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there; ² Jesus also was invited to the marriage, with his disciples. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." ⁴ And Jesus said to her, "O woman, what have you to do with me? My hour has not yet come." ⁵ His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." ⁶ Now six stone

jars were standing there, for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. ⁸ He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the steward of the feast." So, they took it. ⁹ When the steward of the feast tasted the water now become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward of the feast called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, "Every man serves the good wine first; and when men have drunk freely, then the poor wine; but you have kept the good wine until now." ¹¹ This, the first of his signs, Jesus did at Cana in Galilee, and manifested his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

EPIPHANY 2C, 1-19-25, JOHN 2.1-11 <u>SEVENTH VESSEL</u>

Wedding stories are fun. The wilder, the better. I feel sorry for those who try so hard and pay so much money to engineer the 'perfect' wedding. How boring. The more remarkable, the more memorable. No accidents, or mistakes, or practical jokes to remember with joy and laughter in years of anniversaries.

A Washington couple got married 18 stories over the Puget Sound, on the Tacoma Narrows Suspension Bridge. They claim the longest aisle at any wedding. I beg to differ with that claim. I have the singular distinction of officiating at a wedding ceremony that had the longest distance walked and climbed, at any aisle in wedding history.

Marla and Rick called to see if there was a pastor in the Vail Valley that could officiate at the summit house of Notch Mountain. They said they had called a few, and nobody would do it. I told them they should have called a Lutheran first. Lutherans cross-country ski from their snow cave to the 7-11, for coffee and pastry. The Notch, was overlooked by the Mount of the Holy Cross, a beautiful cross-shaped natural wonder that on the northeast face of the mountain, held pristine snow year-round. Both mountains faced each other at 14,000 feet. I said, "Let's do it. But there are some things they will have to know, and be able to do.

"First of all, it is a 4-mile hike with a 4000-foot gain in altitude. It's best if you can make that trek in 4 hours. If you are not regular hiker, that will be a challenge. Bring extra clothes, water, and a mirror and whistle for signaling. If you get dis-oriented, I'll find you!"

(The pre-marital session included reviewing and supplying the couple with topographical Forest Service maps, marked with important natural features and trail markings.)

"Oh," they assured me, "we hike all the time. No problem."

"Secondly," I explained, "our ceremony on the top of Notch Mountain should be done anticipating a noon-time descent. Regular mid-summer thunderstorms pass over the Notch, almost daily, in the early afternoon. The risk of being struck by lightning is very high, above the tree-line. 10:00 AM Saturday would be the safest time. I suggest for ease and comfort that you make the hike a party, with your best man, and maid of honor, Michael and Lisa. Start Friday morning. Take your time to enjoy the Holy Cross Wilderness, and camp-out overnight, near or at the Summit House. Camp above the tree-line where bears won't be foraging, and don't sleep with your food."

My fearless, Harley-riding dog, Cleo, and I left the Minturn Trailhead, early Saturday morning. She danced in the forest chasing marmots and watching for bears. I had earbuds to enjoy Joe Satriani's "Flying in a Blue Dream." It was breathtaking. The solar basketball was crawling over the Gore Range, lighting a deep valley, to my left, and towering forest to my right. Then Cleo went ballistic. On high alert, I pulled my earbuds.

Cleo had just awakened the wedding party of four. So far, they had made it a fourth of the way and they were lucky. They had slept the night with their food in their tents with them. As we began the arduous hike, they were not happy campers. The bride and groom berated, nagged, cussed out, and yelled at each other about who's lousy idea this was. I offered to stop and do the ceremony anywhere. All the views were beautiful!"

"NO!! We are getting married on the top!!" At least they agreed on that.

"If y'all can battle with that much enthusiasm, and then kiss and make up and get on with your marriage, then you got my vote. Let's do it!!" It was the most grueling pre-marital initiation I have ever been a part of. It was a beautiful birth of a new relationship that had just survived a violent gestation. That aisle was four miles long with an altitude gain of 4000 feet. Can you imagine whistling, "Here Comes the Bride", for 5 hours?

The second chapter of John details the beginning of Jesus' ministry. In the very busy last part of John 1, Jesus is baptized and gathers a cadre of disciples to go with him to Jerusalem for Passover. The plan was to stage a visible protest at the Temple to highlight corruption in high places. It is likely that Jesus worked as a craftsman on the temple renovations and would be well aware of the political collaborations of the temple leaders with Rome and the subjugation and erosion of the Jewish faith community. The Cleansing of the Temple was to be his first public overture, a coming-out event, which would form the context of his mission. Disrupting the moneychangers would have threatening economic implications.

Mother Mary changes everything. She insists that Jesus and his friends come to the wedding at Cana instead, on their way to Jerusalem. She knows that public protests can descend into dangerous violence. It is a small interruption on the way to a volatile demonstration.

Traditionally, wedding guests usually sent gifts of wine for the wedding party well in advance of their arrival. Here, Jesus's invitation seems to be an afterthought including hospitality extended to his friends, unanticipated extra guests. The "plus one" involved several disciples. Too late for Jesus to send wine ahead, and too many drinkers....it ran out fast. Mary casually mentions to her son, "They are out of wine."

That is a huge wedding failure. It dishonors the host families. It is a loss of face for all in attendance as well. No wine, implies that there are no friends of the bride and groom. The whole village will suffer disgrace.

Mary has significant social power, because she told the servants to do whatever Jesus said to do, and they obeyed her, even though this party is cratering fast. What Jesus will demand is outrageous. "Fill the purification jars back up to the top and take a cup to the wedding coordinator to drink." That's the community hand-washing water! Yuuuuccchhh! The servants are afraid: "Heads will roll because of this wedding."

Six large jars were there, holding 30 gallons of water each. A stone jar that big could weigh 100 pounds, and the water in it 200 pounds or so. Those jars don't get moved. You can't throw them in the dish washer. The water wasn't potable or sanitary. But it wasn't just water anymore. Parenthetically....

(The economic implications of attacking the moneychangers are local and confined to the temple precincts of Jerusalem. They help to pay the taxes for the Roman tribute. The economic implications of subverting the wine industry of Rome are global! International markets are affected.)

It was the perfect protest. Rome controlled ALL the wine. It exported to Germany, Spain, Africa, and Gaul. Over 50 varieties of wine were produced in

Italy. Rome by itself drank 25 million gallons of wine annually. That is half a gallon a week for each man, woman, and child, slave or free. The peasant farmers of Cana on very small acreages, self-sufficiently supported large extended families with grain, produce, and livestock. But the Roman demand for acreage to plant vines tended by slave labor destroyed these family farms, forcing people into poverty, starvation and involuntary servitude. Not only does Rome control all the wine, but it also controls all the land, and all its people.

Simply, no. Jesus has shown that he controls it all. This event is equally as significant as the feeding of the multitude. The newlyweds at Cana now have 180 gallons of the finest wine. They can buy the Roman senator who stole their land. These community vessels were all filled and later, in the feeding of the multitude the baskets were all filled with bread and fish and all that abundance was just Messianic Kingdom leftovers.

1st century Jewish literature, specifically, 2nd Baruch 29:2-8, describes the Messianic Age; ten thousand vines will each have 1000 branches, each holding 1000 clusters, each cluster having 1000 grapes, each grape producing 60 gallons of wine. To be painfully literate, at the consummation of all time in the Messianic Age, there will be available 600 trillion gallons of wine. That's the beverage menu. The stick-to-your-ribs vittles include all-you-can-eat Behemoth and Leviathan, with neverending manna for dessert. This wedding is only 3 grapes out of 10 trillion grapes' worth of the wine of the Messianic Age, which is already beginning in abundance with joy beyond belief.

But wait a minute. Something is missing. Six stone vessels for purification? That's wrong.... there are supposed to be seven. John's favorite number is seven, the number of perfections. Jesus has seven "I Am," sayings. Jesus performs seven miraculous signs in John. Where is the seventh vessel?

In the Gospel of John, Mother Mary appears only twice, and is both times addressed by Jesus as Woman. That address is an honorific title indicating more than just individual selfhood or motherhood. It invokes the archetype of universal nurturance. Mother Universe, Father God. Holy Matrix of all creation. It's a pretty big word even for the Mom who was there at the outpouring of water into wine at Cana, and at the outpouring of water and blood on Golgotha, when his side was pierced. Mary is the Seventh Vessel.

The sacramental wine poured from her body for the salvation of the universe is Jesus. What an Overture. *It all started with a party, not a protest.* Not bitter complaints, but joyous gratitude for abundance.

Now the faith/wine is pure, heady and intoxicating, not the struggle of starvation, revolution and impurity. Now the faith/wine is generous and free, not the expense of destroyed homesteads, depleted soil and the exhaustion of slave labor. Jesus's Overture at Cana inaugurates his kingdom with a joyful celebration of life and God's amazing grace. It is better than we can imagine, this wine poured into us from the Seventh Vessel. The Sacrament of Jesus himself. Most will serve the best wine first, but God saved the best for last. Amen.
