March 2, 2025 – Transfiguration of Our Lord

FIRST READING: Exodus 34:29-35

The Shining Face of Moses

²⁹ When Moses came down from Mount Sinai, with the two tables of the testimony in his hand as he came down from the mountain, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. ³⁰ And when Aaron and all the people of Israel saw Moses, behold, the skin of his face shone, and they were afraid to come near him. ³¹ But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses talked with them. ³² And afterward all the people of Israel came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the LORD had spoken with him in Mount Sinai. ³³ And when Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; ³⁴ but whenever Moses went in before the LORD to speak with him, he took the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the people of Israel what he was commanded, ³⁵ the people of Israel saw the face of Moses, that the skin of Moses' face shone; and Moses would put the veil upon his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

¹² Since we have such a hope, we are very bold, ¹³ not like Moses, who put a veil over his face so that the Israelites might not see the end of the fading splendor. ¹⁴ But their minds were hardened; for to this day, when they read the old covenant, that same veil remains unlifted, because only through Christ is it taken away. ¹⁵ Yes, to this day whenever Moses is read a veil lies over their minds; ¹⁶ but when a man turns to the Lord the veil is removed. ¹⁷ Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. ¹⁸ And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being changed into his likeness from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit.

4 Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart. ² We have renounced disgraceful, underhanded ways; we refuse to practice cunning or to tamper with God's word, but by the open statement of the truth we would commend ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God.

The Transfiguration

²⁸ Now about eight days after these sayings he took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. ²⁹ And as he was praying, the appearance of his countenance was altered, and his raiment became dazzling white. ³⁰ And behold, two men talked with him, Moses and Eli'jah, ³¹ who appeared in glory and spoke of his departure, which he was to accomplish at Jerusalem. ³² Now Peter and those who were with him were heavy with sleep, and when they wakened, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. ³³ And as the men were parting from him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is well that we are here; let us make three booths, one for you and one for Moses and one for Eli'jah"—not knowing what

he said. ³⁴ As he said this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. ³⁵ And a voice came out of the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" ³⁶ And when the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silence and told no one in those days anything of what they had seen.

Jesus Heals a Boy with a Demon

³⁷ On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. ³⁸ And behold, a man from the crowd cried, "Teacher, I beg you to look upon my son, for he is my only child; ³⁹ and behold, a spirit seizes him, and he suddenly cries out; it convulses him till he foams, and shatters him, and will hardly leave him. ⁴⁰ And I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not." ⁴¹ Jesus answered, "O faithless and perverse generation, how long am I to be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here." ⁴² While he was coming, the demon tore him and convulsed him. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, and healed the boy, and gave him back to his father. ⁴³ And all were astonished at the majesty of God.

TRANSFIGURATION, 3-2-25, Luke 9.28-36 STUCK IN THE DREAM

The Transfiguration is a glimpse of glory, not to be held onto, but to motivate the followers of Jesus and encourage them in their path of service to the world of need and suffering.

Beautiful views from the mountaintop, impart holy, healing power. Through our senses we can apprehend so much more that we can possibly see or feel: Overlooked beauty and detail. Each colorful aspen leaf. Each fragrant pine needle. Each lichen covered boulder. Each perfect pebble sphere coursing down each ten feet of water. Rushing rapids. Each splash, on each rock, limned in light. Each shimmering rainbow drop, prismatically, momentarily defying gravity in a hopeful burst toward freedom, before it's inevitable incorporation back into the waters of the earth, the Blessed Planet! Every moment of every perception of every experience that you have, can be,w and actually is, a Scenic Overlook into Eternity.

Raphael's painting of the Transfiguration includes both the scene of the mountaintop glory, and the healing of the demon-possessed boy down below. It is both sublime and messy. Given a choice, I'd say that it would be more comfortable to stay stuck in the transfiguring dream. That's a perfect moment. But not real for the long haul, and very rare.

There are burial options now where after cremation, your ashes can be formed into a manufactured diamond, virtually indistinguishable from a real diamond, and then you can wear your deceased loved one as jewelry for the rest of your life. It is a very costly process. The only way you can tell the difference between a real diamond and a well-manufactured diamond is that the synthetic diamond is too perfect. No invisibly tiny carbon spots which give each real gem its individual signature and value.

Every advertisement for weight-loss pills presents the before and after pictures of glorious success, a transfigured body from plump to muscular. Just take those dreamy pills. And the fine print on the package says, "Actual results may vary. Works best with diet and exercise." Well duh! Of course, it does. Actually, the pills might not work <u>at all</u>, without diet and exercise. But then everything in your life works better....for free, with the discipline of diet and exercise. You can't buy an easy way out, to make a dream real.

The way it works is through work and the joy of service. Everyone would like an easy booth on the mountaintop, a peaceful retreat. In the book of Luke just before this Transfiguration text, Jesus is explaining about his suffering and death, and on the third day his Resurrection. In the verses immediately following today's text, once again Jesus talks about his betrayal.

Those are not fun words. The disciples, the very people closest to Jesus, who understand him best, do not want to entertain the idea that it is difficult, downhill from the Transfiguration. Those perfect holy moments that mean so much get tested in the real world, down on the plain. After every mountaintop experience you come down to the reality where people have messed up; where grief and fear shatter, where troubles won't leave us alone. You want to close up shop and just go back up the mountain, to celebrate, THAT one great and memorable day.

Entering the day-to-day world effectively as a disciple of Jesus requires regular personal changes in assumptions, thinking, and lifestyle, as we adapt to the need that is here. The need changes constantly and frankly we don't like change. Let's get honest about that. My seminary classmate received a call to a congregation that looked like a perfect match, considering his employment profile, and the congregation's needs profile. He was introduced to one of the elders who had been a member for 60 years. The young pastor said, "I'll bet you've seen a lot of changes. The elder said, "Yep, and I voted agin every one of them."

Billy Graham said, "The world needs changing, society needs changing, the nation needs changing, and the church needs changing. We will never change it until we ourselves are changed." Along the same lines, Leo Tolstoy mused, "Everyone thinks of changing the world, but no one thinks of changing himself." The Rev. Jimbob says, "You can't wind up a sundial, so call it a new day and move forward. Trust God's Power and Plan."

Those moments of awesome transfiguration cannot be held onto and repeated over and over again, and still be effective. It is the drug addict's conundrum. You will never, ever again feel that first high. You can't box up the glory days and do the same thing over and over to get the original experience back. We can't domesticate God. Jesus is not on a leash. He is on a cross, a free sacrifice for us. We say, "Heaven and earth are full of Thy Glory." Then we act like we don't

believe that, all fearful and worried, unfocused and fretting. We are swimming in God's glory. It is there if we look for it now and tomorrow instead of yesterday. You can't drive very far using only your rear-view mirrors.

Peter wanted to build booths to preserve the moment. It was a great idea! The Festival of the Booths in Israel was one of the three required annual pilgrimages to Jerusalem for the men of Israel. It was a triple-header, three-names fantastic festival. As the Festival of the Tabernacles, it celebrated the successful crossing of the desert during the 40-year wilderness wandering after the slavery in Egypt: Remembering and reliving Moses, and tents in the desert. As the Festival of Dedication, it celebrated the anniversary of the dedication of the Temple of Solomon. As the Festival of the Booths, it celebrated the completion of the harvest. You built a booth on your property or in your pilgrimage caravan for a week-long camp-out thanksgiving celebration. On the eighth day there was a trail-ride style parade with the waving of palm branches and other greens that you retrieved from your dismantled booth, and the people shouted, "Hosanna, Hosanna, Blessed is He Who Comes in the Name of the Lord!!!!" Hmmmmm. Sounds familiar.

Peter saw a time to celebrate the completion of the messianic dream with this Transfiguration. Luke indicates that it is eight days after Peter's naming of Jesus as the Messiah, when Jesus stunned everybody by saying, "If so, here is how it happens to the Messiah; I suffer helplessly, I am judicially tortured and murdered, and I am raised three days later." God forbid. The disciples are crushed at this news.

Peter wanted to celebrate a completion like the Festival of the Booths. Jesus simply points out that this a commencement, not a completion. We are not celebrating a finality. We are just getting started. This is the kick-off and its going to be a hard game of thousands of years before completion. It will be 'first and ten' when we come off this mountain and hit a crowd full of needs, and tackle a demon that is shattering and tearing a child to pieces.

There are good times and they strengthen us for hard times. The final scene at the foot of the mountain shows what Jesus will face on his journey to Jerusalem. For Peter it may be spiritual whiplash. They start with a glorious time. Then they descend into the middle of disbelief, suffering, misunderstanding, evil, rejection and death.

Jesus left the glory of heaven and his Father God to go out to the world and die for new life's sake instead of curling up and living for death's sake. Everything is on the move in God's Creation. You can't get stuck in the dream.

Once upon a time, there was a group of people who decided to build a house of God, on the corner of Wirt and Westview. That group had a dream. It was a good dream that thrived in the hard times. That start-up dream could not have possibly imagined over 50 years of education of children from Toddlers to Pre-School; over 50 years of a food pantry that would feed several hundred thousand people, 30,000 people a year for only the last three years. It was a beautiful dream, that changed and grew through Service. Over 70 years and 31 pastors later, we are not looking for ways to relive the first dream. God has spoken through the clouds of human endeavor to provide new dreams in Service. We are not stuck in an old dream. In this transfigured moment, we are commencing to enter and serve the new Creation with a new dream of new hope and vitality! Amen.
