March 16, 2025 – Second Sunday in Lent

FIRST READING: Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18

God's Covenant with Abram

After these things the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, "Fear not, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." ² But Abram said, "O Lord GOD, what wilt thou give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Elie'zer of Damascus?" ³ And Abram said, "Behold, thou hast given me no offspring; and a slave born in my house will be my heir." ⁴ And behold, the word of the LORD came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; your own son shall be your heir." ⁵ And he brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven, and number the stars, if you are able to number them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." ⁶ And he believed the LORD; and he reckoned it to him as righteousness.

LENT 2C, 3-16-25, PHILIPPIANS 3:20-21 DUAL CITIZENSHIP

Father Bill and I were both on a budget: Vows of poverty, you know. We couldn't afford the day rate for parking in a guarded lot, so we parked off of Franklin Street, five blocks south of the Harris County Jail, every Tuesday, our assigned day to do spiritual counseling with both inmates and deputies. We affectionately called our mostly feared parking neighborhood, Beirut, Houston.

One morning, Father Bill was accosted by a man with a sad-looking Saturday Night Special, held together with duct tape. The man demanded his wallet. Father Bill said, "Take it easy. No one's gonna get hurt here. Please point your gun toward the ground, and I am slowly getting my wallet out of my inside jacket pocket." As he slowly opened his jacket up reaching for his wallet, the man saw his clerical collar for the first time.

The thief blanched and exclaimed, "I'm so sorry Father, I didn't know you were a priest. Please forgive me. Please!"

Father Bill said," That's ok, but if you're counting on that raggedy gun, somebody's gonna get hurt." "Look, my friend, while I have my jacket open, I have an extra cigar. We could have a smoke together here for a little bit, and talk."

The would-be thief exclaimed, "Oh thank you Father, so much, but no thank you. I can't. I gave up smoking for Lent." There is a couple of widely differing world views!!!

Tony Hendra, contributor to National Lampoon said, "There are two types of people: Those who classify people into two types, and those who don't." Mark Twain posited three groups: Commonplace, remarkable and lunatics. I suppose a creative person could be all three at the same time. Paul, in Philippians, explains that there are two aspects to every Christian life: We are citizens of the world and citizens of heaven. Living in a Body of Humiliation, anticipating a Body of Glory.

As citizens of the world, we are subject to all the changes that happen to people in the world: fear, danger, frustration, perplexity, the wearing out of our physical body, tempting pleasures and crippling pain, meaningful work, and totally random unpredictable events for which there is no plan.

As citizens of heaven, we proclaim that God is there for us with love, that every experience of this life has meaning, and that we will be transformed as we move through all the phases of eternal life. God calls us to look toward Him and improvise when we are blocked and stumped by our earthly citizenship.

One weeknight in New York City, David Hadju, journalist, dropped into the Village Vanguard to relax and hear some jazz. He wrote about his experience in the March, 2003 issue of *Atlantic Monthly*. Everyone was surprised when Wynton Marsalis, ruler of the jazz trumpet universe, stepped up on stage from the audience, and asked the band to back him on the song, "I Don't Stand a Ghost of a Chance With You." It is a melancholy song, which he played with murmurs and sighs and heartbreakingly smooth emotional legato runs. At the end the words were sobbing through his horn. "I don't stand..... a ghost... of a chance..... the club was enthralled, people were suspending their breath, and a cell phone burst forth with its irritating default tune, before the last two notes of Marsalis' perfect rendition.

Wynton just stood there and smiled. The cell phone owner ran out of the club, embarrassed. Nervous conversation and the clinking of glasses started up. The performance was aborted. But no. He put the trumpet to his lips and played the stupid cell-phone melody note for note. He began variations on the tune, changed keys, changed tempo, the quintet was right there with him like they had practiced this a thousand times. After several heavenly minutes of cell-phone trash tune lifted up into a new world, through brilliant improvisation, Marsalis came back to the ballad and finished, "I don't stand.....a ghost....of a chance.....with you."

A shattering interruption for a citizen of earth, a moment of glory for a citizen of heaven. A citizen of heaven can improvise fearlessly, with flexibility because of the assurance of God's acceptance. A citizen of heaven can accept reality. A citizen of heaven knows that everything has meaning and one day God, who loves us, will reveal it all to us. A citizen of heaven can move forward into transformation trusting in God's will. Is that cocoon the grave clothes of a dead worm, or the baptismal garment of a new butterfly?

Our body of humiliation, becomes our body of his glory, transformed through the power of Our Lord Jesus Christ. Our setbacks are transformed into joys. Painful interruptions become moments of glory. God doesn't give us a pretty little tune with no surprises, no tension and no challenge. He is with us to show us how failure can redeem, even the catastrophic result of a cross.

Richard Luster, my 8th grade art teacher changed my life. He couldn't help but notice that I couldn't even draw a stick man. I was afraid, paralyzed, art was not fun. So, he assigned me to go to the Sandzen Art Gallery, and write <u>anything</u> about <u>any</u> painting once a week. Describe it. Tell what I thought the artist saw or was thinking, or trying to communicate. How did I feel looking at it? Anything. Just give him a page of words about a work of art, once a week.

Then he saw me sharpening my pencil with my pocket knife in class, so, for the final project, he assigned me to write a short story and illustrate it by whittling on one side of a block of balsa wood, inking it and pressing it on paper. A wood block etching. Everyone else in class is coloring and drawing and playing with clay, and here I am writing and whittling and smearing ink on a board.

But by pressing the carved board on paper, the image came out, abstract, but interesting. I was tentatively proud. And then one of the guys splattered ink on my work. I was crushed and angry. It was ruined. I was going to destroy it, and give up, but Mr. Luster said, "Wait. A messy world is what makes art. You have an opportunity to connect the ink splats, anyway you want with a pen. Something beautiful will emerge. You will create something new, never seen before. Your experience will be on that paper. It is your art." Mr. Luster taught a dolt, about woodblock printing an art technique from 1800 years ago in China.

When Paul wrote about citizenship in heaven, he was writing to the congregation in Philippi. Their experience was that Roman citizenship was highly coveted. Philippi was a retirement community for soldiers who had served their time. Veterans of campaigns and battles, they were awarded Roman citizenship. The strong Roman culture influenced clothes, government, language, diet, education and moral values. Residents of Philippi were always aware of their Roman citizenship or their desire to attain Roman citizenship. Paul takes the opportunity to remind them of an even higher calling to citizenship in heaven.

Chuck Colson in his book, *Loving God*, tells of Mickey Cohen, Los Angeles gangster in the 40's, who claimed to be converted to Christianity. But he never changed his behavior or his mob connections. When asked about that, he said, "You didn't tell me I had to give up my career. There are Christian movie stars, Christian athletes, Christian lawyers. What's the matter with being a Christian

gangster? If I have to give that up, count me out." Kinda like that 'stick-up man' not smoking for Lent. Not quite ready yet for the transformation of his body of humiliation into citizenship in heaven, a body of Glory. He was stuck.

Resilient people who accept the difficulties of citizenship on earth, and anticipate the joy of citizenship in heaven, have three great things going for them: <u>They accept reality</u> even when it is awkward, or inconvenient. Against all odds, in the face of despair, <u>they believe that life is meaningful.</u> And <u>they can improvise</u> and bounce back from mistakes and hardship, using that experience for transformation. We are transformed in Christ. Rejoice in your heavenly citizenship. Enjoy your Dual Citizenship! Amen.
